We had a short, whole school assembly during which we read The Dragonfly Story that helped to explain the death of a loved one to children. After the assembly, the children had a craft afternoon when they made dragonflies and wrote down their fond memories of Mrs Menzel. These dragonflies were then be displayed along the fence above the flower bed in the front playground. Morpurgo class also planted seasonal flowers and bulbs that will appear later in the year.







We are mindful and sensitive to all our community at this time. This not only includes those who worked with or met Mrs Menzel but also those for whom her death triggers feelings of sadness and loss due to events in their own lives. SCIENCE COMPETITION: This term we ran a science competition as part of the Science Oxford project. The children got into groups and came up with a question that they had to investigate and then present to their class. The best investigation in each class then presented to the whole school where one team were selected by a panel of judges (Mr Denham, Ms Gurga and Mrs MacDonald) to represent the school in the next round of competition.

**MURPHY CLASS:** Our topic for this term has been Once Upon a Time. We have been enjoying reading lots of traditional tales as well as new twists. We particularly enjoyed Jack and the incredibly meanstalk which led us to asking the big question in Science 'Where is the best place for a bean to grow?' We have placed beans in the oven, in the fridge, hidden in a dark cupboard and on the windowsill...the results have been very interesting!

As part of our topic, we have also been learning about castles, knights and dragons. We found out about the different features of castles before making our own castles using a variety of materials. We were particularly proud of the one we made outside that had a drawbridge, battlements and turrets!







**DONALDSON CLASS:** This term in Donaldson we have been reading a book called 'Wild'. We've written a description of the main character and a newspaper article inspired by the story. In D&T we've made our own wild pictures of minibeasts with moving mechanisms. We've learnt about charts and tallies in maths, which we've then put to good use in science, where we have been working in teams on our own investigations for the Big Science Event. We have investigated: the best way to clean muddy shoes; tuck shop preferences across the school; whether packed lunches or school dinners take longer to eat; and which play equipment is the most popular. We've presented our results in our own charts, which we've hand-drawn and then recreated in computing on the chrome books. We're pretty pleased with our posters! We've also been trying to grow our own cress which we are looking forward to eating in an egg sandwich at the end of term.







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**BLAKE CLASS:** The children in Blake Class have been learning about Anglo-Saxons this term. We created our own timeline to show the location of this period in British history. We have compared our lives with everyday lives of people during these times, thinking particularly about how they coped without supermarkets! We explored why Britain was attacked by different tribes and learned about the Vikings. We have also been working towards designing and making shields. In Science we had lots of fun with Mrs Pascoe, working on our investigations for the Big Science Event.

After writing a setting description based on this term's book: Arthur and the Golden Rope, we learned about using inverted commas in direct speech ready for writing our newspaper reports about Arthur's quest. We had fun acting out interviews with Arthur and the god of thunder: Thor. In Maths, we enjoyed learning about angles and turns, as this took us outside! We have also learned about bar charts, which linked with our computing lessons; we now know how to create bar charts using spreadsheets.

Finally, a big thank you to Mrs Isard for our brilliant dance lessons!







**DAHL CLASS:** This term has been good fun in Dahl class! Our topic has been Anglo-Saxons where we have compared our lives to how they lived and learnt about Alfred the Great. This fitted in nicely with art where we made Anglo-Saxon shields. In English, we have been reading the book 'Arthur and the golden rope' which has enabled us to write newspaper articles about Arthur defeating the wolf, as well as creating our own narratives. We were even able to enjoy the little bit of sunshine we had by acting out scenes on the field. Our big science events have been great fun! The range of experiments from looking at how far sound travels, to which toothpaste protects teeth the most from coke, sure have been eventful! We have learnt all about the Easter story in RE, creating our very own last supper with bread and wine... (Ribena).









**MORPURGO CLASS:** This term Morpurgo have learnt all about rivers and mountains around the world and how they are formed. In science, the Big Science Event had children forming their own questions to conduct an experiment and using a range of skills to record their results and presenting a poster on their investigation. Exploding a watermelon was definitely one of the highlights of this term!

Children have been thoroughly engaged reading 'Kensuke's Kingdom' by Michael Morpurgo and we have produced some amazing pieces of writing which include a setting description and a persuasive leaflet. In RE children have explored the events of Holy Week and considered the question whether Jesus was aware of his impending crucifixion and compared this with a sense of purpose and destiny.

We are all looking forward to our Easter holidays and look forward to returning to learn all about the Amazing Mayans!









**SHAKESPEARE CLASS:** Shakespeare Class have worked incredibly hard this term, with learning inspired by our *'River Deep, Mountain High'* Geography topic. Michael Morpurgo's brilliant book *Kensuke's Kingdom* has provided a captivating stimulus for our writing – first setting descriptions and then first-person narratives from the perspective of a different character.





#### LIVING WITH COVID

From the start of the summer term, we will be following this guidance:

- Children with mild symptoms such as a runny nose, sore throat, or mild cough, who are otherwise well, can continue to attend their education or childcare setting.
- Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay
  at home and where possible avoid contact with other people. They can go back to an
  education or childcare setting when they no longer have a high temperature, and they
  are well enough.
- If a child has a positive COVID-19 test result (i.e., families have chosen to buy a test for themselves) they should try to stay at home and where possible avoid contact with other people for 3 days after the day they took the test. The risk of passing the infection on to others is much lower after 3 days if they feel well and do not have a high temperature.
- Adults with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days.
- Children and young people who live with someone who has a positive COVID-19 test result should continue to attend as normal.

In summary, if your child is well enough to be in school and they don't have a high temperature, they should come in. There is no expectation or requirement for anyone to complete a lateral flow or PCR test. Note: we will no longer be putting up Google Classroom work if a child is off with COVID.
